If you attended the Janet Rogers workshop in September, you experienced a real treat. What a wonderful.

generous, fun, and talented lady! Surrounded by lovely examples of her watercolor portraits, we sat spellbound as she, with such seeming ease, demonstrated and produced exceptional works of art.

First we were given a mini course in the difference in proportion of the faces of adults and children. Then we started with blind contour drawings, continued through gesture drawings (great poses, Shirley!) and on to monochromatic value studies based on our photo references. We were also introduced to Janet's favorite skin tone triad: Aureolin Yellow, Permanent Rose and Cobalt Blue.

Her demonstrations were accompanied by constant tips and guidelines:

- Pull shadow shapes together.
- Pull whites together.
- Soften the edges with water, or "smush" the edges to soften.
- Vary colors in shadow areas.
- Start with mixing paint puddles.
- Change warm to cool for movement.
- Get the feeling of the subject; the feeling is more important than the details.
- Create interesting negative shapes.
- Keep direction of light in mind.
- Don't get rid of your whites.
- Use warm colors in holes.

- If you don't know what to do, just do something! It might lead you into a new direction.
- Give yourself permission to be less than perfect.
- "Whatever it takes!"

What made her demonstrations special, other than the superb results, was her ability to show us how to correct the "oops - well, that didn't work!"

The workshop activities were completed with a satisfying critique of all our work.

Jo exhibits and has won awards in local juried shows. She has also won the Jeanne Dobie Award in the Philadelphia Water Color Society's 100th Anniversary International Exhibition. She is a signature member of the Pennsylvania, Philadelphia and Baltimore Watercolor Societies.
