Julia Krackov, Featured Artist

Julia Krackov has lived in the Wilmington area for over forty years. Graduating from Oregon State University with a BS in Chemistry, she began her career at Yale University in biochemical research.

Moving to Delaware with a young family, she began painting studies with Ruth Egri Holden, Ed Loper, and Henry Peacock, and studied print making with Joan McClure. Early work included batik and watercolor. Floral and landscape subjects were most frequently used. Her work has been exhibited in numerous group shows including the Delaware Art Museum, the University of Delaware Regional Exhibit, Council of Delaware Artists, and the Chester County Art Association.

In the early 80's. Julia returned to full time employment in the insurance industry, specializing in the reinsurance field. During this time she earned the CPCU (Chartered Property Casualty Underwriter) designation.

Since retiring from Cigna, Julia has enthusiastically resumed painting, primarily in watercolor, and occasionally in pastels and oils. She has studied with Wendy Scheirer, Eo Omwake, and taken workshops with Skip Lawrence and Frank Lynch. Julia is a past president of The Studio Group.

- Resume and Artist Statement.
- 10 digital images on a CD which can be viewed on a PC.
- The images can be submitted individually on the CD or in a PowerPoint format. Each image must identified with artist name, title of work, date, media and framed dimensions.
- Digital images must have a maximum size of 600 x 450 pixels and not exceed 2 MB per image.

Notes of Howard Pyle's Monday Night Lectures, transcribed by Carolyn Anderson.



A matter of tones will not make a picture but one must imagine and feel it all vividly.

Make real things, real surroundings - A tone for a background will not do - it is false.

Each person has background, which is constantly changing as he goes from place to place and it is never twice alike - it may have a resemblance but that is all.

Mr. Edward's "Man in an iron foundry"

This subject is great - not because there is a fire and two men half- naked before it with interesting effects of light - but from the fact that in that dim room and in that great heat men are turning the crude elements of earth into things for the use of man. Through a dust as from iron which envelopes everything you see these men - their lower garments bunched and shapeless, their lean gleaming bodies sinewv and knotted - black - streaked and streaming with sweat rising above - these men darting about like ants doing you can hardly tell what. Suddenly that great door is thrown open and there is a flood of light which bursts out like an inferno.

Olive Rush's "Doorway and four figures."

This door is wrong because it is architecturally wrong and if I were to close it the jar would break the panes of glass surrounding it. Be rational and see always that you build things in a real way.

Lights define texture and color - shadows define form.
