Mr. Ashley, what is this? Ah, a whaler returning home and finding some near one has died during his absence - and this is the grave—I feel this is too much of a story-telling picture.

Every art has its limitations.

In literature you cannot tell the story in one complete (impressoire?), as in a picture, but must tell the different causes leading up to a climax - and in music you cannot describe anything but emotions.

I will describe this incident to illustrate what I mean.

Once I was in Broad Street Station and suddenly as I looked at the crowds of people pouring out of a train opposite me I noticed a young girl - clad in the heaviest black. Other eyes were on her - a somber figure of a girl in that vast mass of moving humanity filled with pursuit of pleasures and mundane affairs.

Slowly she moved along weighed down with her black, and there at the heavy iron gateway - an elderly man - clad also in black - came towards her.

She threw back her veil and he kissed her again and again as people do only under stress of great emotion.

The tears feel from her eyes—Quickly she brushed them away and again he kissed her.

As I thought it over I imagined all the incidents leading up to that meeting and thought what a great picture it would make.

In painting we can only picture the surface moment leaving to the imagination what precedes & follows.
